FROM THE COL COMDT QLD

Greetings everyone. The festive season is well and truly upon us so no doubt many of you are now working feverishly to finish up those last minute tasks before you go on leave or posting. For those that have far to travel by road; please consider leaving yourselves a day or two to slow down and refresh, prior to departing on your trip, rather than leaving straight after "knock-off".

I attended the 2014 Corps Conference at the end of October. This year the theme of the conference was: 'RAEME – Maintaining Plan Beersheba'. Briefly, Plan Beersheba is the name of Army's modernisation plan resulting in the creation of three 'like ARA brigades' (1, 3 and 7 Brigade) rotating through a 36 month force generation cycle; with each phase (Readying, Ready and Reset) taking 12 months. Reserve units will also be impacted by Plan Beersheba. The ARES will consist of six brigades which will be paired with each pair of ARES brigades marrying up with an ARA brigade, including being on the same force generation phase.

Actual tasking is yet to be determined, but not surprisingly, 'maintaining' the Army's diverse range of equipment, (including support to amphibious operations) is going to pose some major challenges

for RAEME, as some of the more complex equipments are dispersed across the three brigade locations. Some tanks have already been relocated in support of the Battalion Group in Adelaide and tanks and ASLAV will also be moving to Townsville next year, as part of the relocation of 2 Cavalry Regiment. A decision as to whether or not some tanks will be re-located to Enoggera is yet to be determined. Regardless of where the equipment will be located, or how complex these new equipments become, RAEME will be well and truly up for the challenge. These exciting times also present new posting and technical mastery opportunities. For me, the most rewarding part of the conference was the opportunity to take part in a syndicate workshop; listening to the well reasoned solutions being presented by our current and future Corps leaders – I can only say their efforts were outstanding. Not surprisingly, industry will continue to have a major role in our life; however the dynamics of the Defence/industry relationships, in maintaining Army's equipment, is set to change with a more integrated approach and Army taking back the responsibility for some 3rd line maintenance.

Closer to home, the Queensland region has again featured highly in the RAEME awards with soldiers from 3 and 7 Brigade winning the National and regional Craftsman of the Year awards:

- National Craftsman of the Year - CFN E.J. Lockie, 3rd Command Support Regiment, Townsville;
- North Queensland Craftsman of the Year - CFN B.J Corling B Squadron 3rd/4th Cavalry Regiment, Townsville; and
- South East Queensland Craftsman of the Year – CFN J.D Ross, 106 Field Workshops, 7th Combat Service Support Battalion.

On behalf of the Head of Corps Brigadier Andrew Mathewson, congratulations to the winners; your awards were richly deserved. In addition I would also like to congratulate the recent Head of Corps commendation recipients COL Peter Snowden (Rtd), MAJ Ray Norman (Rtd) OAM, Mr Ian Hartshorn and Mr Gary Sargent for their outstanding work in support of RAEME soldiers.

Thank you also to RAMS in Oakey, 106 Fd Workshop Enoggera and the RAEME Association of Queensland for their excellent RAEME Birthday functions. Have a Safe and Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year

CORPS HISTORY PROJECT

In the last issue of our Spanner News, I provided an update on the progress of the Corps' new memoir, "With Skill and Fighting – Craftsmen of the Australian Army 1942-2014". The key advice from that edition was:

- the final version of the Corps History manuscript was 'with the publishers'; and
- the team was working hard to have the book printed by the end of November, in time for the Corps Conference, at Bandiana from 30 Oct 14'.

Update. I can now report that we didn't meet that deadline because of the need to undertake additional proof-reading, which has added delay to the publication schedule by about two month. In addition, the layout work has taken longer than planned as we acquired more photographs from the Australian War Memorial (AWM) to balance the stories.

Where are we today? I am pleased to report that:

- the book's layout work has now been completed, final proof-reading has been undertaken and all minor amendments have now been incorporated;
- the author, Max Carmichael, and I, worked with the publisher on 18 Nov 14 to complete the final editing, which corrected statements of fact, syntax, punctuation and the captions of some photos and text; and
- I returned to the publishers on 1 Dec 14 and authorised the despatch of the final proofed manuscript to the printers. I expect the book to be printed and returned to Bandiana HOC Cell, by late February, for distribution to those who have placed orders.

More advice will be forthcoming, but I encourage you all to continue monitoring the new RAEME National Association Website and RAEME Face book. <http://www.raeme.org.au/>. If you wish to place an order, please go to the 'shop' tab on the website and follow the prompts.

The photograph shows an ASLAV fitters vehicle from Reconstruction Task Force Three (RTF-3) providing support and over watch during an operation in the Bellucci Valley, Uruzgan Afghanistan in November 2007. The vehicle crew, mainly from 2/14 LHR, were SGT Nick Shaw (crew commander and a Fitter Armourer), CFN Mark Hazelwood (driver and a Vehicle Mechanic), CFN Andy Powlesland and WO1 Ian Aitken (rear shooter, and an Electronic Technician and Vehicle Mechanic respectively).

Best Story. The best story award was won by WO Ian Baker, ASM of 6 Engr Regt, and describes his experiences as part of the Security Detachment – Baghdad – a short excerpt from the book is provided below.

‘SECURITY DETACHMENT - BAGHDAD

As the ‘Coalition of the Willing’ advanced through Iraq, the Australian Government decided to place an ambassador in Baghdad to open political and trade avenues between the two countries. To protect the Ambassador and consulate staff a Security Detachment (SECDET) was established. SECDET was also tasked to support other Australian Forces within 200 km of Baghdad, such as training teams to the north. An integral part of SECDET was a small RAEME workshop section. Warrant Officer Ian Baker recalls with pride the achievements of that section:

Initially the SECDET detachment was located outside of the US constructed ‘Green Zone’. However as the security situation in Baghdad degraded, resulting in numerous small arms attacks and bombings aimed at SECDET, the mission was

relocated into the reinforced Green Zone. SECDET’s new location was known as ‘The Cove’ in honour of the first ANZACs at the ANZAC Cove. The RAEME section quickly established its presence and commenced work.

Early rotations were required to conduct road runs as far north as Taji in support of the Australian Training Team. These runs took the SECDET teams along some of the most bombed and attacked roads in the world; and they were always supported by an ASLAV Fitters vehicle. Teams tasked with a run operated in full body armour. Inside the vehicles, temperatures regularly reached above 50 degrees air temperature, made all the crews work exceptionally hard for hours on end. Reaching the destination brought welcome relief and rest for all except the RAEME detachment who immediately began work on the cars after the Red Zone run had finished.

While some vehicle temperatures inside were measured at up to 66 degrees, outside hull temperature was measured during one summer at 79 degrees, hot enough to cook eggs on. Working with gloves on was common, and while the gloves were uncomfortable they prevented the hands from being burnt on the vehicle’s hulls. Where possible, night work routines were utilised. As most attacks occurred at night this practice meant the tradesmen were awake when the rockets and small arms fire started and were able to take cover more easily than if they were half asleep. Repair tasks were often exposed to small arms fire cracking metres overhead and occasionally landing within the repair task area. Close

rocket and mortar attacks merely suspended the repair task for a short period if at all, as most teams kept working through the attacks, taking the very RAEME approach of 'get stuffed I'm busy'.

The essential work performed by the SECDet RAEME detachment was the corps quintessential small FRT doing great stuff in tough and dangerous conditions.'

Conclusion. We have waited a long time for this book and I admire your patience. Those of us, who have read it from cover to cover, are equally patient, but more importantly, confident we have great stories to tell about the Corps and its members. These stories will not only be appealing, but rightfully promote the reputation of the Corps.

Defence Force Remuneration. Once again, Defence servicemen and women are being treated shabbily. I refer to the recent pay 'rise' brokered on behalf of all servicemen by the Chief of the Defence Force. The Chief has agreed to accept a 4.5% pay increase over three years. That equates to a 1.5% increase per year. That is about 50% of the current CPI of 3%. But the CPI has been officially recognised by both the Australian Bureau of Statistics and the Australian Government as not being a real indication of the cost of living increases. The result can only be that the wages of the Defence Force will be effectively decreased. The servicemen will also have to give up 6 days Annual Recreational Leave and some other entitlements, such as Extra Recreational Leave and have increased periods to earn Higher Duties Allowance. Disability Pensions. As stated above, the CPI is not a suitable indexation method for the consideration of the cost of living. Bearing in mind that we fought for 20 years to break away from the CPI as means of indexation of Defence Super, how can the Government now decide to revert to the CPI as the indexation for our Disabled Military members who have given so much of themselves (and their families) to our Nation?

Pressure on Local Federal Member. I am absolutely stunned by such decisions and every Australian should pound on the door of their local Federal Member and press for the government to reverse these decisions. I have already done so, and I encourage everyone, serving and retired, to write/email their local Federal Member. Just a

simple objection about the unfairness will do; the numbers may make a difference. I do ask you to be clear, concise and, above all, polite. You may also care to write a letter to the Editor of your local newspaper.

DFWA Update No 284. This update details a number of points not covered in the October update, including:

- The budget impacts on Veterans' Disability Pension.
- Indexation, access to employer contributions and Maximum Benefit Limits.
- Military Superannuation Benefits Scheme (MSBS), in particular the new ADF Superannuation Scheme.
- ADF Workplace Remuneration Arrangements (WRA).

Other Budget Outcomes.

- Axing the three-month backdating of Veterans Disability Pension claims – a long standing benefit acknowledging the unique nature of military service;
- Axing the Seniors Supplement of Gold Card holders who do not receive income support - this amounts to \$876.20 annually;
- Withdrawing the Government's share of an agreement with the States to fund Service Pensioner's Concessions for travel, electricity, phone and council rates;
- Withdrawing the provision to not count as income Military Superannuation when applying for a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card; and
- Withdrawing indexation on the Clean Energy Supplement added to Veterans Affairs pensions and payments causing it to quickly lose real value over time.




