NEWS FROM THE ARMY SCHOOL OF ELECTRICAL AND MECHANICAL ENGINEERINGS (ASEME)

New Badge and Flag for the Army School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering. Army and Air Force personnel at the Army School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering (ASEME) assembled on the 8 Aug 18 to conduct a Unit Insignia, Flag and Unit Shoulder Patch change ceremony. The changes from the RAEME insignia to the current unit symbology have been brought about to cement the bi-service nature of training to RAEME, RAE and RAAF technicians. The reference to the Army Apprentices School insignia; which was also used for the Army College of TAFE, reflects on the school’s history and is symbolic of the values that are required of all military technicians, values which still remain unchanged to today.



The meaning of the badge shown above is as follows. At the apex of the badge is the Crown of the Sovereign, expressing allegiance to the Sovereign, Superiors, Duty and Country. Superimposed on a cogwheel, which represents trade and technical training, is the English Cross of St. George, depicting the virtues and development of character. The St. George’s Cross is then overlaid with crossed, doubled–edged swords, representing military qualities of courage, discipline and physical fitness. Superimposed upon the swords and the cross is a flaming torch of learning.

Prior to becoming ASEME, RAEME Training Centre was the Corps school, which all members of RAEME attended throughout their career to develop technical mastery. Today ASEME conducts initial training for ground technicians, as well as Army aviation technicians, as they progress through their careers. In the future, ASEME may also include elements of the junior officer training. It will continue to have an important part to play in the provision of maintenance management training and development.

Message from ASEME OJT Cell located at Enoggera. For many of our readership, you may not be aware of the role played by the ASEME OJT Cell located at Enoggera. Courtesy of the Trade Training Management Officer (TTMO), WO 2 Allan Stephenson, and one of his charges, in this article we get a glimpse of the work done at this Enoggera outpost of ASEME. Here is short outline from CFN Cameron, who is completing his technical training at Enoggera:

“Prior to commencing training at ASEME, I spent 7 years in the army as Infantryman posted to 6 RAR, before deciding to learn a technical trade which will be useful to me and the Army.

On arrival at ASEME Bonegilla/Bandiana, I was confronted with a four-week block of Common Induction Training (CIT) which included Mathematics, English and Military Writing as well as RAEME history. For a simple infantryman that had been out of school for 10 plus years, I found the course challenging, but the civilian and military instructors provided enormous help through every step of the way.

Once CIT was completed, I moved to Vehicle Technology Wing (VTW), to soak up as much information and knowledge as I could. For someone who is a kinaesthetic learner, it was rather challenging to learn 80% of my trade from a text book. I managed to fumble my way through the theory side of things so I could get my hands dirty on the practical tasks and learn more. Morale was high as I regularly updated my Manager after completion of every MLO and slowly watched that yellow bar creep all the way to the end of the course modules. This was followed by our “March-out parade”, observed proudly by family and friends, and then off to “Brisvegas” to begin my OJT.

At the start of OJT, my excitement at being 100% hands on with trade and learning, had me jumping out of my boots, so high that I was shocked when I received a logbook that was the size of a Mack truck. From almost 8 years in Defence and being deployed overseas, OJT would have to be the highlight of my career thus far. With a new detachment every month, with a combination of military and civilian organisations, I feel like the quality competencies I have gained over the last year have been second to none. For me, the best detachments were Mack VCV and Rocklea Diesel, where I learnt the most and quickly achieved the required competences for my log book. I enjoyed every detachment working my hands to the bone every day and taking note of what jobs I completed so I could transfer them into my large log book each night while it was still all fresh in my mind.

My best advices for anyone beginning this journey is to hit the ground running and smash out as much work as you can and not just chase “sign-offs”. That approach simply overlooks the whole point of OJT, which is to learn and gather as much knowledge and understanding as you can. You only get one opportunity at it, so make the most of it.”

CORPS HAPPENINGS – PLAN CENTAUR



Plan CENTAUR, while making progress during its implementation phase, now has a broader focus that captures Army’s goal of “improving land materiel effectiveness”.

Program Director General, BRIG Dave McGahey, said “That while the program will continue to have a

RAEME focus, it is now ready to engage wider land materiel reform efforts with the tools and data developed through the initial stages of the Project.”

“Much of what CENTAUR has been doing in the early phases has been to understand Army’s materiel management requirement and the tactical-level change vital to maintenance system effectiveness,” BRIG McGahey said.

“One of our focus areas over coming weeks is the need for operator and maintainer synchronisation in planning as well as the development of a Capability Realisation Plan to engage the likes of CASG, JLC, CIOG, and Army HQ agencies to achieve structural reforms,” BRIG McGahey said.

CENTAUR is aligning its projects and activities around three Lines of Operation (LOO): enhanced decision making, reducing the cost of ownership, and modernising the maintenance system. Each project for the remainder of the current stage, and into the next financial year (subject to approval), will be strongly linked to the LOOs.

The program’s current focus areas include:

- Implementing the first phase of a new maintenance enabled Vulcan dashboard that integrates ACMS and MILIS data to enable decision making at all organisational levels;
- Determining options for Army to reduce the cost of ownership of major platforms; and
- Training/mentoring commanders, operations staff and maintenance personnel to drive improvements in equipment forecasting and maintenance planning.

Following the completion of a Mid-Point Review and executive consideration of the Capability Realisation Plan, the program will strive to ensure the long-term benefits it is driving are realised.

DFWA INFORMATION

Introduction. There are a lot of things going on at the moment where DWFA is trying to influence events at the National level. We are attempting to have the Royal Commission into banking and superannuation fund management scrutinise the Commonwealth Superannuation Corporation (CSC) that manages all military superannuation schemes. CSC is currently excluded from the TOR. ADSO with RSL National (working together) issued a statement on this.

In this Edition, I will just address the 3 AAT cases where veterans were challenging the taxation of superannuation Invalidity Benefit taxation.

The basic issue is the interpretation of the Superannuation Industry (Supervision) Regulations (SISR) 1994 Reg1.06 Meaning of pension (Act, s 10), as applied to the Invalidity Benefits paid from military superannuation. SISR is complex but there are several clauses indicating that Invalidity Benefits should not be classified as an income stream (fully taxed at marginal rate) but as lump sums (reduced taxation rate).

One indication is that to be a fully taxed income stream “the total of payments from the pension in a subsequent year cannot vary from the total of payments in the previous year unless the variation is as a result of an indexation arrangement or the transfer of the pension to another person.”

DFRDB and MSBS Invalidity Benefits can and do vary. They are subject to review for life, and veterans can and do go from Class A (100%), to Class B (50%) and C (0%) payments and vice versa. This is unlike the public service equivalent payments which are not reviewable after two years. Most industry equivalents make a single untaxed lump sum payment.

Previous Action by Veterans. Since 2015, veterans have been requesting CSC, through MPs, for government to state which part of SISR they are using as basis for decision that Invalidity Benefits are an Income Stream. The question has been avoided. The stock avoidance answer has been provided from the Treasurer down. There have also been many requests for an ATO Private Rulings on this issue. ATO stalled (over 18 months) on granting private rulings. In early 2017, ATO contacted those veterans seeking a ruling and suggested they use alternative legislation provisions to classify payments as lump sums, but the ATO deliberately did not inform veterans that this was regarded as a loophole and had been closed. This effectively cancelled all requests for private rulings and avoided the SISR question.

To quell the media attention last year regarding taxation changes to the other legislation and many veterans being adversely impacted, the ATO offered three veterans who had Private Ruling requests, Test Case Litigation Funding in order to resolve interpretation of SISR. Although the three Veterans were affected by different super legislation, all were governed by SISR. Details are:

- Veteran A – covered by DFRDB Invalidation Benefit. Accepted funding. Represented by legal team.
- Veteran B – covered by MSBS pre-2007. Self-represented. Refused funding due to distrust of the ATO offer due to earlier duplicitous behaviour in deliberately not informing veterans that the tax “loophole” offered to them by the ATO was closing.
- Veteran C – covered by MSBS Post 2007. Represented by legal team. To reduce stress caused by an ATO legal red herrings concerning medical eligibility for the payments, this hearing will not be open to the public.

All three Veterans have had a compulsory Medical Discharge for many conditions including PTSD.

All Cases are to be heard 0930 on 28 (Veteran B) -29 May and either 30/31 or 1 Jun (Veteran A) consecutively by Presidential AAT (precedent setting) in the Federal Court in Brisbane. With the exception of the Veteran C, whose case is to be heard on 29 May, and is closed to public, all are welcome to attend. I am sure the veterans would appreciate your support. Go to the entrance and see location on the Notice Board.
