MESSAGE FROM THE REP COL COMDT – BRIG DAVE MCGAHEY CSC (RTD)

As 2015 opens, our Corps is in for another challenging year operationally and domestically. Members of RAEME have now deployed in support of our new national commitment in Iraq and UAE and will continue to be involved in winding-down our commitment to Afghanistan. There is no doubt the challenges for RAEME of maintaining the battleworthiness of equipment in the these harsh, hostile and remote environments will continue for some time, but as always, the Corps will rise to the occasion with our traditional 'can do' attitude.

Domestically the Defence Budget will come under increasing pressure as the economic headwinds for the national economy prevail. That said, members of our Corps are currently involved in some major re-equipment programs for Army that will see the rump of the A & B vehicles & bridging equipment replaced under capital equipment projects Land 121, Land 400 and Land 155 respectively. This work will permit RAEME to reset our current maintenance workload and business processes.

Restructuring of the Army will continue apace under Plan Beersheba with the movement of tanks and M113 to Townsville in 2015. The support and through life support concepts and plans for this move are currently under review by Army with a view to achieving similar business process and productivity gains already achieved under Plan PELICAN for the RAEME support to Army's aviation component.

In my own project, the Defence Logistics Transformation Program, the first and second builds of newly established logistic bases valued at \$752m, which were opened in Moorebank and Darwin respectively in the second half of 2014. It is proposed that five other new facilities will be delivered in 2015. These new facilities are located at Bandiana (Feb 15), Edinburgh (Feb 15), Amberley (Mar 15), Townsville (Jun 15) and Perth (Stirling and Palmer Barracks) (Apr 15). Also Hobart Workshops is actively under consideration for upgrades for its facilities, which will accompany the delivery of Land 121 vehicles.

For RAEME on the domestic front, we are eagerly awaiting the printing and delivery of the Corp History books. Brig Ross Grant (Rtd) is doing and excellent job of delivering this outcome for the Corps, and I must thank him and his dedicated team, as well as the many hundreds of contributors to the CHP outcomes for their work to date.

Greetings everyone and Happy New Year for 2015. For many of you, this year has started at a hectic pace, with induction training completed, and you're well and truly settling into your job. As is almost always the case at this time of the year, many of you will have already deployed on disaster relief operations here in Australia or perhaps even overseas. For some of you, and your families, this is your first trip to Queensland, so you are also getting to know your local environment: new jobs, new schools and in some cases, new (or not) accommodation. My only piece of advice is: 'keep your families informed so that the 'big' move does not get bigger.'

My role here in Queensland, as Colonel Commandant, is to keep you informed, as best I can, of the many things going on in the Corps and also convey your views to the Head of Corps, BRIG Mathewson, and keep him appraised of what is

happening here in QLD. Much is happening in the Corps with the introduction of new vehicles and weapon systems and the re-alignment of weapons and personnel in support Plan Beersheba. Not to mention the tremendous amphibious capability (HMAS Canberra and HMAS Adelaide) starting to 'come on line'. You can all expect to see HMAS Canberra somewhere off the QLD coast as the ship and her crew undertake sea-trials this year. An exciting and highly dynamic time for everyone, including the RAEME personnel involved!

Army is not oblivious to the dramatic challenges that are/will occur over the next few years and so has commissioned a study to examine how maintenance in Army will be conducted in the future. Over the next few months you will start to hear more about Plan CENTAUR. It is very much early days so not much information is available other than a Land systems maintenance study is about to be conducted to examine many of the challenges you are dealing with on a daily basis or will deal with over the next year or so. I hope to better inform you of the details of Plan CENTAUR in later editions, so watch this space. As for Aviation, Plan PELICAN (a series of projects examining all facets of aircraft maintenance and logistics) is almost completed. For those of you working in the aviation capability, some of the results have already been implemented, with more to occur over the next few years. Whilst many of the results have proven to not be revolutionary per say, you will certainly see opportunities to improve your skills, leading to improved job satisfaction and equipment availability.

I still intend to take every opportunity to meet as many of you as possible and to convey the messages from our Head of Corps personally when ever possible. Certainly an exciting year with us about to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Gallipoli campaign this coming ANZAC Day and the Corps History Project coming to fruition, shortly thereafter. These events are a unique and very special time to be part of the RAEME community; and something to be cherished for many years to come.

For the majority of trainees, this was their first formal dining-in, and appropriately it was hosted in the hangar in which most of their RAEME technical training is undertaken. An ARH, MRH and S-70 flanked the dining tables, adding a sense of seriousness and purpose to an otherwise relaxed atmosphere.

The formal part of the night consisted of the farewells for COL Steve Evans and MAJ Ian Johnson CSC. In his farewell speech, COL Evans spoke about the mentors he gained and the valuable advice that helped him throughout his career. COL Evans also spoke of the high quality of the soldiers and officers in RAEME, and his passion for fishing.

Attendees also farewelled MAJ Ian Johnson CSC, a veteran of RAEME, with over 40 years service and experience. Fittingly, MAJ Johnson finished his career as a mentor to some of the newest Craftsmen in RAEME, working as the Army Liaison Officer at RAAFSTT and then as the 2IC of RAMS. The very busy night also included an address from BRIG Andrew Mathewson, Head of Corps, and the ceremonial handover of RAMS from the outgoing CO, LTCOL 'Arthur' Tsamis to the incoming, CO, LTCOL Rob Boughen.

The Royal Australian Navy contingent embedded in RAMS also participated in the festivities, demonstrating some of their own dining-in night traditions, including not standing for the toast to the Queen. RAMS' senior Navy member, Chief Petty Officer Tebbit, assured the audience that it was not sign of disrespect to the Queen, but a tradition dating back to dining in restricted spaces on 19th century warships. Navy personnel would remain seated to avoid hitting their head on the deck ceiling, known in Navy speak as the 'deckhead.' Rumours that Chief Tebbit had made this up, as he was too lazy to stand, were quickly dispelled after consulting the relevant ceremonial manual.

The after dinner mess games were once again lively and RAEME themed, the most popular being the torque wrench challenge which consisted of two tests; in the first test, the competitor was required get as close as possible to a specified value in a single pull on the spanner, the goal of the second test was to achieve the maximum possible torque value. The maximum value achieved was a dubiously high 400 odd Newton metres of torque using a 30cm long spanner – so far no official response has been given to enquiries by ASADA.

A Busy Year for 106 Fd Wksp 7 CSSB, Gallipoli Barracks, Enogerra. 2015 will be one of 7 CSSB busiest years to date, with 7 Brigade becoming the ready Brigade in July 2015. The Battalion has hit the ground running at the beginning of the year to ensure that everyone is ready for the exercises that 7 CSSB will be involved with throughout the first half of the year.

The Battalion has many other activities to accommodate including a number of commitments to the 100th anniversary of ANZAC day on the 25th of April, before the Battalion prepares itself for a busy three months of training exercises to become the online CSSB for the Army.

The first exercise will be a Battalion deployment to Shoal Water Bay Training Area to conduct platoon to company level training as well as a number of range shoots. This exercise will prepare soldiers for the rest of the year including deploying for the Combined Arms Training Activity (CATA) in May, for three weeks, preparing for Exercise TALISMAN SABRE and Exercise HAMEL for five weeks over the June – July period.

Following these exercises, the Battalion will be certified ready for any potential operational deployments that may arise and will work during the second half of 2015 to ensure that a high level of readiness and deployability is maintained by all officers and soldiers within the Battalion. The Battalion will have a Combat Service Support Team (CSST) on standby to be able to deploy at short notice if needed, with a follow on CSST in reserve to support any deployments that units within 7 Brigade may be tasked with.

2015 will also see the Army Reserve units located within the Battalion moved out of the unit to allow 7 CSSB to take up a larger complement of ARA soldiers in accordance with the new Plan Beersheba establishment. This move will grow 106 Field Workshop by over 60 personnel with other transport and Supply companies within the Battalion also growing substantially. Under plan Beersheba, 7 CSSB will also acquire a PMV squadron that will be utilised as a Brigade asset to provide protected mobility to brigade units around the battle field.

Overall 2015 is set to be a high tempo and challenging year with all members of the Battalion poised to provide close logistical support to 7

ANZAC Day 2015 is fast approaching and planning is nearly complete. One IMPORTANT thing to remember is that the Brisbane parade, this year, kicks off at 0930. Also, the parade is much bigger due to the extra contingents marching to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the landing at Gallipoli. Each of these contingents will be represented in period costume and equipment where possible. Please invite all of your friends and family to come along. The contingents include the following:

The RAEME Association Queensland (RAQ) contingent is **number 81**. It will form up in George Street somewhere near Mary Street. The contingent numbers will be displayed (in order) on nearby building walls. The RAQ banner will also be proudly displayed at the front of the contingent. The step-off time is not 'set in concrete', but will be around 1000 - 1030 hours.

Protocols. Please remember the March Protocols, which are designed to respect the dignity of the occasion:

- The wearing of fraudulent medals and awards is NOT permitted. Section 80B(1),(4) of the Defence Act 1903 makes it an offence for a person to wear a service decoration that they are not entitled to wear, or to falsely represent themselves as a person on whom a service decoration was conferred.
- Veterans are to wear full size medals.
- Those WW11 veterans able to march the full distance of the Parade are welcome to parade behind their Banner at the front of the parade with one carer or one person of discretionary age.

- Large groups of descendants wanting to march may only do so behind the banner 'Descendants of Veterans All Conflicts' – please check the Order of March for positioning.
- Those disbanded Units/Ships or Squadrons wishing to Parade their Banner at the front of the contingent may only do so when they have gained approval from the ANZAC Day Combined Parade Committee without descendants – P O Box 45 New Farm Qld 4005.
- Pictures of deceased Veterans are NOT permitted to be carried on Parade
- Any livestock, including dogs MUST have approval from the ADCPC to enter any area of the ANZAC Day Parade – there are NO exceptions as this is a WHS requirement.
- Children being pushed in pushchairs or carried in slings are a potential OH&S risk and parents are asked to refrain from including them in the parade.
- Unit Leaders on parade are responsible for the appearance of those marching with their associations and to stipulate the need to respect the March Protocols as set down by the ADCPC.
- Closed in footwear is a requirement on parade.
 Those marchers that do not comply with this requirement, do so at their own risk.

Taxi Services. If you have need of a taxi please contact me directly and I will explain the procedure to obtain such services.

Post March Function. Put ANZAC Day 2015 in your calendar now. Bring your friends, bring your family, especially to the RAQ ANZAC Day Post March Function. It is without a doubt the premier RAEME function Australia-wide and again this year it will be held at the Fix Restaurant, Port Office Hotel, 40 Edward St, Brisbane. Separate instruction on this part of the day's activities will be provided later.

CORPS HISTORY PROJECT

I advised recently on the RAEME National Website, and in the last edition of the 'Spanner News' for 2014, that the final manuscript for the CHP book was with the publishers, and a number of our team were collaboratively completing the final editing process. I am happy to report the book was provided to the printers shortly thereafter.

On 2 Apr 15, I was advised that two pallet loads of books have been despatched from China to Australia – the expected delivery date at the HOC Cell Bandiana is now around 30 Apr 15. Given this firm time-line, I have recommended to the HOC, BRIG Andrew Mathewson that the project team will continue:

- with the on-line sales process over the next few months, and subsequently encourage our community to continue purchasing the book on-line; and
- for his HOC team to plan for the commencement of book distribution soon after the books are available at Bandiana/Bonegilla, in early May 2015.

Our other good news is that BRIG Mathewson, has negotiated, with assistance from COL Tom Reynolds the COL COMDT – NSW/ACT, for the national book launch to occur on 15 Jul 15 at the Australian War Memorial (AWM) in Canberra. This launch will include a number of activities, including the changing of the guard, a 'Last Post Ceremony', to celebrate the life of a soldier, who died on active service, and a wreath-laying.

As usual, I have provided a small sample of the book's content. This story is told by a unique officer in our Corps, Major Carolyn Breeden, who was inextricably linked with the work of bringing into service out newest helicopters over a significant period of time. I hope you find this excerpt from Chapter 16 Technical Solutions and Procurement, both interesting and stimulating.

Flying High. 'Two of Army's recent and more prominent acquisition projects are Air 87 and Air 9000 Phases 2, 4 and 6. Under project Air 87 Army sought to acquire an Armed Reconnaissance Helicopter (ARH) capability, while under Air 9000 a Multi Role Helicopter (MRH) capability was required. Again RAEME played a significant role in both these projects. One member of the Corps who played a prominent role in both projects was Major Carolyn Breeden. During 2001, Major Breeden was posted to the Air 87 project in Canberra where she took part in the Tender Evaluation and Contract Negotiation phases of the project. Then in 2002, she was selected as a member of the test crew for the project's activities in France and for the next four years she lived and worked in France as the project's resident Flight Test Engineer (FTE).

Major Breeden was then posted to the Air 9000 project, remaining overseas to conduct engineering and flight test activities on the MRH90. She returned to Australia during 2008 to work on the MRH90, with duties focused on flight and engineering issues across production acceptance, acquisition and sustainment. Major Breeden's work during 2011-12 focused on capability impacts of identified deficiencies.

The Resident Project Team in France (RPT-F) was established during 2002 in Marignane at the Eurocopter site, following the Tiger ARH's selection as the preferred solution under Project Air 87. The team comprised Army, RAAF and civilian personnel and included piloting, instructional, logistic, quality, configuration, finance and administration personnel.



The flight test crew provided input into specification definition and system modification when test results were unsatisfactory. The FTE had a technical bias; while the test pilot was more operationally focussed; however together they provided a complementary skill set. An FTE covers most engineering streams to some degree, providing a link between the operators and engineers and contributing to contractual compliance and qualification/certification. As the FTE for the team, my job was to work with the test pilot designing and conducting tests and then reporting on findings to ensure the systems were operating as required by the approved functional and performance specifications and they were meeting the operating intent. In the MRH90 I primarily occupied the jump seat, behind and between the pilots.

As a Tiger ARH FTE, I occupied the rear station, usually the Battle Captain's position, with the pilot in the front and slightly below. I operated the systems under test, including firing weapons using the sighting systems. I spent four years with ARH in France and those years were the most challenging and rewarding years of my career to date. Of the many challenges faced, firing the 30 mm nosemounted gun for the first time was one of the most demanding test flights, due to the time constraints and developmental nature of the program.

There was no work-up flight or prior simulation; and from the very first shots fired the results were being recorded, telemetered and analysed. Of course we faced other challenges. Firing the Hellfire at night was also a very demanding test flight as we had some anomalies during the flight and when ready to fire the missile we had just enough fuel to complete the run and get back to the airfield. After the long flight, my attention was distracted as the missile left the launcher and appeared in the sight. My targeting drifted slightly as a result, but the Hellfire struck the target, accurately hitting the aiming point, providing a lethal demonstration of its capability, despite my inattention.



While we have focussed on many stories with an operational edge, we have also tried to show the wide span of activities in which the Corps has been involved over the last 70 odd years. It is breathtaking! Thank you once again for your faith in the book and your patience.

DFWA COMMUNICATIONS

DFWA Matters - So Far This Year. 2015 is not shaping up to be a very successful year for DFWA. Our first effort was a personal letter from our President, David Jamison, to the Prime Minister, Tony Abbott, detailing matters the Association would like the Government to address. These included the:

recent budget initiative to reduce the indexation of Veterans' and War Widows Pensions and the veterans' Disability Pensions to the pre-2007 formula of CPI only;

- initial ADF pay determination (since increased from 1.5% to 2% but still below a pay rise as such); and
- proposed increases to Defence charges for married quarter rent, uniform and rations that are more than the recent salary increases.

Unfortunately, the reply from the Prime Minister was less than encouraging. It was essentially the 'paid political announcement' of the need to get the budget under control and reduce the deficit. However, on a positive note, the Government will not proceed with the increase in Defence charges for housing and rations, and there will be further meetings to discuss Veterans' mental health issues, the next one scheduled for 24th March 2015.

The following is an extract from the March 2015 Issue of Hotline, the Queensland Branch companion Newsletter to the March Issue of Camaraderie.

'The Military will be in the news a lot this year with both the centenary of Anzac and the operations in the Middle East. It is hoped the Australian public in general will come to appreciate the sacrifices that members of the Australian Armed Forces and their families made, and are making, when serving their country. There are also articles on a proposed Military Covenant and differentiating the ADF from police and other emergency services. If you have not read them, I would commend these articles to you.'

Can DVA help you? Many people perceive that if they do not have operational or qualifying service they are not entitled to any help from DVA. This perception is far from the truth. As well as any serving or ex-serving members being able to access VVCS, DVA will also assist in the treatment of a number of conditions such as Cancer, PTSD, Alcohol and Substance Use disorder.

Eligibility extends to those who have had more than three year's continuous full time service from 7 Dec 1972. In these circumstances, DVA provides for treatment only, not compensation. A medical condition needs to be accepted as related to military service to be eligible for compensation. DVA Factsheet HSV109 Non-Liability Health Care provides more detail.

Whilst these benefits may not be all that relevant for those currently serving, it is nevertheless very important knowledge for members after discharge. The limited general awareness of these DVA provisions is a concern. A link to the document is at: http://factsheets.dva.gov.au/factsheets/documents/HSV109%20Non-Liability%20Care.htm

If you feel you may have a claim you could submit one direct to DVA. However it is strongly recommended that you use the services of an advocate or pension officer, such as offered by DFWA's, Wally Buldo, to ensure that all of the boxes are ticked and ensure a smoother progress of your claim.
