Well done to everyone who took the time to reach out to the extended RAEME communities in your respective areas; we will all benefit from your efforts and local celebrations.

Notwithstanding our significant commitment to overseas operations, the recent Cyclone Debbie and subsequent flooding had placed additional pressure on our RAEME personnel throughout Queensland and they continue to do excellent work. Organised and led by the RAQ, I want to formally recognise the tremendous efforts of the RAQ committee and ANZAC Day sub-committee for organising the gathering, and post ANZAC Day march event at the Port Office Hotel. With nearly 500 people in attendance, the event went without a hitch thanks to the great work of the organising committee and the staff at the Port Office Hotel. Despite the additional security placed on all ANZAC Day activities the event was a great success and a real testament to your planning, resilience and patience.

In early July I attended the RAEME gathering held at the Mermaid Beach AEME SLSC on the Gold Coast. It was a tremendous function and my appreciation goes out to Eddie (Beans) Bevans and Barry Skinner for having organised the function. Beans was largely responsible for 'herding' the Gold Coast based folks with Barry having only just returned from overseas several days before the event to pitch in and take photos on the day. CORPS HAPPENINGS – PLAN CENTAUR

Plan CENTAUR is enhancing operational capability while improving efficiencies in the barracks environment through the delivery of a series of maintenance reform and improvement projects in stages over a three year period.

CENTAUR will soon complete the first stage of its implementation phase which is already having an impact on the way maintenance is carried out in Army. Efficiencies as a result of Lean training, improvements in the accuracy of force generation demand planning and access to technical and production information on portable ICT devices in workshops are just some of the ways Plan CENTAUR is reforming maintenance practices.

"After a period of detailed analysis we are excited to be delivering improvements for Craftsman right through to Defence's strategic equipment managers. As well as process changes we have also delivered improved tooling and trialled a smarter way to provide workshop consumables".

In May, the first of two trials of improved portable ICT devices begin in 3 CSSB. The trials will introduce

handheld tablets to enable maintainers to access tech pubs on the workshop floor. It will test the viability of software and hardware, and measure the efficiencies in work practices as a result. A second trial will be conducted in June in 2/14 LHR (QMI).


Meanwhile, Lean training continues in 7 CSSB in May. All three combat Brigades have now been exposed to Lean and the Units involved are reporting greater efficiency and a higher standard of maintenance. WO1 Kitching, ASM 2 Cav Regt said "the workshop was disorganised which contributed to waste. We now have a more functional layout and reduced waste which has increased the standard of maintenance. An outcome is that the transition to CSS CONOPS has been relatively smooth."

Plan CENTAUR has identified multiple MILIS improvements. It has also identified means of reducing specialist training; improving the flow of the reverse supply chain and is developing a blueprint for adoption of information technology to enhance maintenance decisions.

In the next stage, Plan CENTAUR plans to build upon the productivity and training improvements started in stage one along with a number of new initiatives. A key focus will also be the development of a maintenance strategy for Army to inform the way future capabilities are maintained. "The next stage of the Program will help cement the benefits across the maintenance system to ensure we deliver lasting change" said BRIG McGahey.

AROUND QUEENSLAND UNITS

102 Fd Wksp - Townsville. 102 Field Workshop were away on Ex TALISMAN SABRE at the time of this newsletter so no contributions were available. However, 102 Field Workshop together with the NQ RAEME Association will be hosting a dinner in Townsville on 26 August 17 to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of RAEME. The event is being held at the Townsville RSL.

Rotary Wing Aircraft Maintenance School (RAMS) – **Oakey**. CH-47F Chinook training has commenced at RAMS. Historically, CH-47D maintenance courses were delivered overseas to qualified technicians as transitiononly courses. The inaugural Australian-based CH-47F technician course commenced on 15 May 17 with a course panel of six aircraft transition students. The students will soon proceed to C Squadron to consolidate their learning through On-Job-Training (OJT) where, once qualified, they will provide a valuable contribution to generation of CH-47F rate of effort.

The CH-47F training system delivered under the acquisition project includes:

• Cargo Helicopter Maintenance Training Aid (CHMTA) – A15-201 decommissioned and transferred to RAMS in December 2016. Students can apply power, operate the hydraulic systems, motor engines, operate the avionics systems, and fit role equipment.

• Maintenance Blended Reconfigurable Aviation Trainers (MBRAT) – simulates the CAAS architecture and allows students to interface with an immersive virtual environment to isolate and rectify faults induced by an instructor prior to rectifying the faults on the tactile CHMTA or CAT for aircraft and avionics technicians respectively.

• Chinook Avionics Trainer – a live CH-47 converted into a training device allowing avionics students to conduct OJT including troubleshooting systems covering communications, navigation, power, and interfaces. Both MBRAT and CAT are manufactured by American company Kratos whose training devices are used by the United States Army's 128th Aviation Brigade (US Army Aviation Logistics School) at Fort Eustis, Virginia. The CAT is scheduled for delivery in July 2018.

• New RAMS Training Facilities – Conversion of the JLU-SQ warehouse into 'the precinct', complete with classrooms, Defence computer network connectivity and hangar power.

106 Fd Wksp – Brisbane. 2017 marks the 75th anniversary for the Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers and it was only fitting, that the Corps celebrated this milestone accordingly, as part of the 2017 ANZAC Parade in Brisbane. Army School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (ASEME) Brisbane OJT Cell. They come, they grow and they go. The revolving door of the Brisbane OJT Cell continues to spin with perpetual motion. There are rumours that the flow from ASEME will begin to taper later in the year (we hope).

At the moment one goes out (usually to 7 CSSB) and one posts in. With the manning at 7 CSSB currently, the OJTs are being posted into surplus pool positions, while the first line units continue to struggle with the reduced manning brought about due to CSS CONOPS.

We continue to field calls from struggling first line unit ASMs eager to take on OJTs in order to boost their production. This has been great for our OJTs, who have gained valuable experience, but not an ideal situation for the overall development. With all of the requests for OJTs for EX Talisman Sabre and our obligations to WONCO Sub 1 EN party and commitments to our civilian detachments, we have unfortunately had to decline requests from the Units.

The OJTs generally spend 12 months developing their knowledge and skills before they are ready for posting. The feedback we are receiving regarding their training has been really positive, with the very occasional unfavourable report.

During their 12 months they will generally undertake a 50:50 mix of civilian and military detachments of a month in duration. Some of them tend to need a reminder from time to time that they are in the Army whilst on civilian detachment. I'm sure we all remember OJT's as being some of the best times of our career. The TTMO and ATTMO conduct regular unannounced site visits to

maintain the relationship with the civilian detachments and also to keep the OJTs 'honest'.

One of our most popular civilian detachments is the QLD Water Police. This detachment is for a trainee Fitter /Armament. Whilst detached to the Water Police the OJTs will service and repair, the approximately 100 strong fleet. Craft from 5 metres with outboards up to 20 metre vessels with twin inboard diesel propulsion and complex hydraulic systems are maintained. The trainees will usually undertake a field trip or two, for a week in duration, taking them from the Gulf to the Cape and all the port cities on the East coast. OJTs are currently detached to the QLD Police, QLD Water Police and QLD Fire & Emergency Service and this arrangement has been extremely beneficial in gaining experience.

We trust that we are delivering a trained and competent craftsman/soldier to your workshop and expect that you will notify us of any potential areas for improvement.

DFWA INFORMATION

Non-Liability Health Cover. We understand many people are unaware that DVA will pay for treatment for a number of conditions **and they do not need to have been service related**. The criteria to access support for mental health and substance abuse conditions is now **only one day** of Full Time Service. All cancers and TB are also covered but have different eligibility criteria. This is quite valuable as DVA covers the 'gap' costs. If you know somebody, who may benefit from this information, contact DFWA, or one of the other ESOs for help.

Qld Veteran Advisory Council (QVAC). The QVAC provides advice to the Assistant Minister Assisting the Old Premier who is responsible for veteran matters in Qld. Through QVAC, DFWA is still pursuing the adoption of a Qld Veterans' Charter aimed at ensuring current and ex serving ADF members and their families are not disadvantaged in access to state delivered services. This is particularly aimed at families not dropping to bottom of waiting lists for medical, education, disability and other services when members are posted inter and intrastate. We have also approached all political parties for Qld to appoint a state Minister for Veteran Affairs to provide a focus for veteran matters across various portfolios, e.g., health, police, prisons, coroner, to address issues such as homelessness and suicide. Other states have a dedicated Minister who attends the Commonwealth's Veteran Ministers' Round Table which helps co-ordinate delivery of veteran services Australia-wide. The LNP have adopted this as policy and Labor is expected to follow shortly.

Open Forums for Members and other ESO. We have held two Open Forums so far this year. The Sunshine Coast Forum in February was organised by VP Win Fowles. About 50 members and other ESO reps attended, including the local MP. Speakers included National President, Qld RSL President, other Sunshine Coast ESO reps. We held another mid-June at Victoria Barracks for the Brisbane Region. Speakers were the National President who provided a DFWA update, including current Pay Case progress, Rob Shortridge representing QVAC, John Lowis (Military Covenant) and Peter Burns, Administrator and Founder of the Facebook site, ComSuper-Military Entitlements. It was attended by over 50 with Members, ESO reps and a good number of serving ADF people from Amberley and Enoggera.

ADF Pay Case. DFWA is an Official Intervener at the Defence Force Remuneration Tribunal for ADF Pay. Early discussions with CDF on the 2017 Workplace Remuneration Arrangement (WRA) established some principles with all parties not wanting a repeat of last fiasco. The Initial Offer is 2% per annum with no loss of conditions of service. DFWA focus is on whole package – Home Loans, Various Charges. MQ Rents, not being out of proportion to the Pay Rise. Feedback will be sought from serving ADF when details come out.

Facebook Groups Run By Younger Veterans – **Supporting Across Australia.** DFWAQ is in regular discussions with the Administrators of two groups, ComSuper- Military Entitlements and ADF Invalidity Payments-Taxation Treatment. The Groups do a really good job, providing advice and support on-line. Both are involved in challenges in AAT and Federal Court aiming to force ComSuper to report the nature of DFRDB/MSBS Class A/B Disability Benefits to be in accordance with the legislation. The current media headlines are about a side issue which developed out of this legal action. If successful, this will impact on tens of thousands of current recipients of these payments with possible refund of tax going back to 1997.

A successful outcome will also impact on Family Court asset splitting decisions which were based on incorrect ComSuper advice. The leads in this are 2 ex RAEME Craftsmen who have represented themselves in the Federal Court against solicitors and barristers of ComSuper and the ATO and so far have won.
