PROTECTED MOBILITY VEHICLE – LIGHT (PMV-L) OR HAWKEI

What is HAWKEI? It is a Protected Mobility Vehicle – Light (PMVL). It is designed to replace the Land Rover. It does everything that a Land Rover did – but much better – with impressive protection systems and state of the art communications and weapons capability! While most projects introduce a Military off the Shelf or Commercial off the Shelf system, the Hawkei mission system started from a clean sheet of paper just a few years ago. The Mission System continues to evolve as the design is refined. The vehicle is designed and built in Australia at the Thales facility in Bendigo.



The mission system contains a number of cutting-edge innovations for this class of vehicle including:

Drive line configuration: the engine and transmission sit side by side in the engine bay (think MII3) with the front of the engine facing the rear of the vehicle. Drive is transmitted via two right angle "cross drives". This design means there is no large drive line mass under any crew position – really important in a blast event.

Integral Computing System (ICS): the ICS is an interface that allows the operator to access the SOTAS intercom, radios, Battle Management System, live vehicle system data and workshop manuals from one screen. In the future we aim to integrate Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, Advanced Field Artillery Tactical Data System (AFTADS), Digital Terminal Control System (DTCS) and the next generation Force Protection Electronic Counter Measures (FPECM).

Integrated Starter Generator (ISG): The ISG bolts directly to the rear of the engine and looks like a bell housing extension. It replaces the conventional alternator and starter motor and produces 15 kw of on-board power, with the capacity for further growth ensuring that the mission system is future proofed.

The Land 121 Phase 4 Project Office has been working hard to ensure the best possible capability is delivered to Army and Air Force, so it is undergoing a critical testing regime to ensure nothing is missed.

CORPS HAPPENINGS

RAEME Corps Conference. The annual RAEME Corps Conference was held in Randwick Barracks, Sydney, from 23 to 25 Oct 2018. A full report will be forthcoming for the next edition of Spanner News, but readers should be aware that this very important conference involved a large number of Corps' members discussing seven topics critical to the modernisation of Army maintenance capability and assimilating the impact of new technologies. These discussions will provide the official Corps position informing Army's acquisition, sustainment, recruitment, trade development, technical and military training and career management for many years to come.

Topic One will review how the Corps can use the technical and trade knowledge of our personnel to influence the Employment Category Review within a rapidly modernising Army and its system of equipment maintenance.

Topic Two will develop potential solutions to the maintenance of system or systems, and other integrated capabilities, including the use of OEMs and contractors, intellectual property concerns, and the training required to support new maintenance systems.

Topic Three builds a Corps position on Battle Damage Assessment (BDA) and Repair (BDR). BDA/R is governed under the TRAMM-L and DEFLOGMAN, but they focus on who can authorise it – the CDF – and how it is governed when it is authorised.

Topic Four examines the fundamental relationship in a workshop – that of the Workshop Commander and the Artificer Sergeant Major and the tendency for the junior workshop commanders to be seen more as platoon commanders and administrators vs technical managers.

Topic Five is a proposal for a system to provide technical advice on trade matters taking into account Army's modernisation and strategic environment. A single POC for all technical trade matters will provide consistent advice aligned with Army's requirements.

Topic Six will provide a Regimental Pathway for Craftsmen that provides detailed guidance on becoming an RSM. Just as the Corps has officers that choose between command and technical professions, so too Craftsmen have choice between a trade and a leadership career.

Topic Seven addresses the issue of diversity (education and trade backgrounds, prior service and employment etc) within the Corps. How can the Corps assist Army's recruiting efforts to attract potential soldiers and officers? Is this primarily a matter for recruiting?

It is only through thorough research and wide-ranging discussion that the Corps will develop robust ideas and doctrine for maintenance modernisation.

You will no doubt have seen advertising like the following of recent times making it clear that: "This year, you will get a My Health Record unless you tell us you don't want one. REVISED ADF TRANSITION SEMINAR FORMAT LAUNCHED – MINISTER FOR DEFENCE PERSONNEL

ADF members and their families transitioning from the permanent Australian Defence Force (ADF) will have access to a more tailored approach to manage the transition process thanks to a refresh of the way support is delivered

Minister for Defence Personnel Darren Chester announced on 10th October the format of the ADF

Member and Family Transition Seminars has been revised to better meet the needs of those leaving the permanent ADF

"We have responded to feedback from ADF members and their families to ensure the seminars are family friendly with an emphasis on early engagement," Mr Chester said.

The seminars are now a one-day expo-style format, so attendees can tailor their experience according to their own needs

Concurrent information sessions will be held covering topics such as health, finance and career planning with representation from state and territory governments and ex-service organisations.

"The new seminar format and enhanced online content provides flexibility for families who have other commitments or are based interstate at the time. Family members who cannot make it to the session that the member is attending can still register to attend on another date or location, or access the information online at any time," Mr Chester said.

The first one-day model ADF Member and Family Transition Seminar is being held today at Melbourne Park Function Centre, Rod Laver Arena.

DFWA INFORMATION

For several years now, DFWA has been fostering the development of the Alliance of Defence Service Organisations (ADSO), as a means of bringing together the numerous voices of the veteran community – mainly to speak with one voice to our elected parliamentarians, government departments and the media. ADSO now comprises about 20 defence service organisations, including the Australian Army Apprentices Association. While complete unanimity is a bit of a pipe-dream, on many issues a united approach has been possible, such as the campaign for an Australian Military Covenant which now has all-party support in Parliament.

In the last year, the RSL (National) has joined with ADSO in calling for Terms of Reference of the Haynes' Royal Commission into financial entities to be changed so that the Commonwealth Superannuation Corporation (CSC), the minder of all military superannuation schemes, is included. We believe CSC should be subjected to the same scrutiny as the managers of super schemes of all other Australians. Given the horror stories and the headrolling consequences that have come from the recent RC so far, there is clearly a lot of house clearing required in

that area. ADSO, together with lot of help from veteran groups, have provided many examples of wrong-doing. The current Test Case litigation at the AAT concerning taxation of Invalidity Benefits mentioned in the last Spanner News, is a direct result of wrongful actions by CSC. Claims of there being adequate scrutiny already in place, do not stand up when the public record is examined. For example, not one question was directed at CSC in Senate Estimates Hearing last year when there were a record number of complaints.

Apart from joint media releases, and an open letter to the PM, there has been extensive lobbying going on concurrently. Lobbying means writing letters to, emailing, meeting with, social media (ising), discussing, etc, the issues with MPs, Senators, Ministers, departmental personnel, media, (ranging from the ABC to Alan Jones) et al. A lot of time is spent on this together with research and producing papers to back up our claims. All done by volunteers. Since July, DFWAQ has met with several MPs and Qld Senators, spoken with the Minister for Veteran Affairs, the ex and new PM, the Leader of the Opposition and had a lengthy meeting in our office at Victoria Barracks with the Shadow Minister for Veteran Affairs. For the latter, we were joined by the RSL(Qld), Veteran Clawback representative and ADSO national spokesman, together with a DFWAQ member double-hatting as the Commonwealth public service union rep.

Keep an eye out for further activity in this area over the next few months. We are also preparing for veteran policy priorities to be pushed at the coming election.


