Some of these tasks include the following:

- Coordinating economies of scale purchasing of specific RAEME merchandise. This initiative alone has the potential to create savings for all associations across Australia.
- Investigating the purchase of common insurance policies. Once again potential savings to be obtained by all.
- Production of a National Calendar of RAEME Events for publication in the Craftsman Magazine and regional newsletters.
- Managing national projects, e.g. Operation Spanner Pack and assist the Corps Committee Corps History Project Director develop a new version of the Corps History.
- Obtaining visibility of Corps members leaving the service to encourage them to join the regional associations Australia wide. This is wonderful opportunity for recruiting new members and refreshing our associations to guarantee their longevity.

Whilst on membership, all current members of the regional associations, who have agreed to affiliate with the RNA, will automatically become members of the RNA free of charge. This free membership will also apply to all serving members on continuous full time service ARA, GRES etc. Other GRES folk on part time service can become members by joining the home state/territory regional association, and by this affiliation, become members of the RNA.

All the practical and financial benefits from the establishment of the RNA will flow directly to the affiliated regional associations. Each affiliated regional association has a nominated representative on the RNA Committee.

I encourage anyone who has questions on the development of the national association to contact me and I will attempt to answer them. The aim is to keep this process as simple as possible and to provide better services to all members of the Corps – past and present.

We know that ANZAC Day and RAEME Birthday across the state in 2012 is going to be, with your support, bigger and better than ever as we will be celebrating the Corps' 70th Birthday this year.

Financial members look out for your free gift on ANZAC Day and RAEME Birthday Luncheon. Nonfinancial members, pay, join and obtain a free membership badge, free gift and discounted entry to our various functions. Membership is only \$10. The above free items and entry to functions is valued at around \$54 – so full membership is to be valued! More later from the Membership Chair. FROM THE COL COMDT

By way of introduction, I joined the Army in 1980 as an Electronic Technician apprentice (35th class). To complete my apprenticeship, I was posted to 1 Base Workshop Battalion. While I would like to say I found my calling within RAEME, I always yearned to fly the skies as a pilot. While my pilot aspirations never quite got off the ground (pardon the pun), I was given the consolation prize of being posted to 5 Avn Regt Wksp as the AO/QM. This was the start of a

Frank Maloney (13th) has provided the following report on what was a very successful event in the life of the Australian Army Apprentices Association (AAAA). Frank was part of a dedicated organizing committee, which included the Chair of the AAAA, Mr Frank Poole (10th), the Treasurer Mr Owen Reynolds (13th), and several other committee members of the AAAA. The event also relied on a lot of volunteer assistance from non-committee members, who reside in Canberra, and the local reunion coordinator. Frank Poole.

The Meet and Greet at EPIC restaurant on 27 Oct 2011 was the first of the functions and was lively and most enjoyable. The venue was bigger than needed, and a little out of the way, but it was close to the Australian War Memorial (AWM) Annex which houses the artefacts not on display at the AWM.

The Brian & Barb Daley (14th) Raffle Inc, in company with, Trisha Richardson and Lorraine Grant, together with their band of volunteers, once again took control of the raffle and raised over \$1200.

The Wreath Laying at the Australian War Memorial was the highlight of the Reunion and included the Senior Wallabies Choir, the Royal Military College Band, and a well researched and powerful Eulogy, delivered by Norman Wells (14th). Corps History Project Gets Underway. As a result of a decision made by the RAEME Corps Committee in October 2011, approval has been given for the RAEME Corps History Project (CHP) to commence.

The intent of this project is to celebrate the achievements of individuals, sub-units and units of the Australian Electrical and Mechanical (RAEME) Engineering Corps during warlike operations and peacetime training activities. other equally important intent is to capture and record stories that have underpinned and enhanced the reputation of RAEME over the past 70 years and ensure they are recorded in perpetuity.

It is hoped that these stories will inspire all members of the Corps, in particular the newest members, giving them a sense of pride in the Corps' achievements, its contribution to the nation in general, but specifically, its contribution to the ADF. These stories are also important to the general Australian community, who know little about the "back room boys" of the Army, and their contribution to the Army's war-fighting ability through the effective management of land equipment in war and peace.

The CHP Team has been established to seek contributions in the form of stories and photographs, from past and current members of the Corps, to be developed and published as a pictorial history, or

memoir, for public sale. The book will be published in a "coffee table" style format.

The project's intent is in line with the Corps Vision statement and the goals of the newly released RAEME National Association's Strategic Plan (1 Dec 11). In that plan Goal 1, "Promote the Corps' identity and reputation across Australia", and Goal 2, "Recognise and celebrate the achievements of the members of the Corps", epitomise the intent of this project. The project is an important component of the national association's activities on behalf of the Corps.

Under the general direction of the Corps History Project Board, the CHP Team is authorised to request and collect contributions from past and present members of the Corps through all available communication channels and compile and publish the contributions in a book entitled "In Peace and War – A Pictorial Memoir of the Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers".

The Corps History will address various facets of the Corps' support to operations and training over time, by reference to major ADF activities or operations; and by chronological sequence of events (e.g. RAEME in Timor 1999 to 2011). Past and present members of the Corps are encouraged to provide photographs of interest, together with short accounts of the events depicted in the photo or photos.

The success of the book is highly dependent on good quality photographs being made available. The photographs in themselves should depict an interesting story, or specific activity, in which members of the Corps participated or led. However the written account, which underpins the photograph, is equally important and should focus on telling a story of the human element depicted of the photographed activity within the context of an historical event.

It is anticipated that a very readable and interesting publication can be produced if all the stories can be brought together coherently. Having said this, it is essential the accounts are accurate, have a historical underpinning and do not depict the narrow view of a single person.

For all potential contributors, a good theme to guide your story line will be to apply the 'Five Ws' to an incident, activity or event, which occurred during your service life and to tell the story in your own words. Think along the lines of: "What is the activity or event I am trying to depict; Who amongst my unit, mates or colleagues played a part in the event depicted in the

story and photographs; Why were they involved in the activity; When did the event occur and what was the broader context; and Where was the event located."

Over the coming months more information will be provided, but as a starting point, look at the advice that will shortly be provided on the RAEME National Association Face Book page and the RAEME National Association website. When your story is ready, please send it to raemeprojectbook@hotmail.com where it will be checked for suitability and passed to the CHP Editor for further editorial changes to ensure it fits cohesively in the final book. "Letters From Timor"

Here is a book worth a read. One of our Corps colleagues, who changed Corps from RAEME to the Royal Australian Chaplaincy Corps, has written a book about his experiences in Timor. MAJ (Chaplain) Graeme Ramsden, deployed to Timor in 1999 and wrote "... prolifically and bluntly about his experiences to his family." In the words of a review in the "Mildura Weekly" on 30 Sep 11, " ...the book is well illustrated, but readers will find some of the images - and text - disturbing, a graphic reminder of the atrocities that ordinary people can carry out under mob rule. The destruction in Dili is well documented, there are pictures of mass graves, destroyed houses and market places, the house in Balibo where five Australian newsmen were shot as Indonesia invaded in October, 1975, a poignant funeral service, burnt-out school, a cathedral and church where people were slain, and groups of orphans."

Graeme's book also contains some very blunt observations about the coalition of countries who were involved in the deployment and for this reason alone it is a book very much worth a read. "Letters from Timor" is available through Big Sky Publishing.

Progress on the Fair Indexation Bill – A Fight for Fair, Just and Equal Indexation. This update from our Defence Force Welfare Association (DFWA) Representative, Peter Snowdon, gives our members a broad summary of the status of the current campaign. The DFWA believes the method of indexation, used to keep military superannuation payments in line with rises in the cost of living, is not fair, or just, or provides equity.

The DFWA exists solely for the purpose of promoting and protecting the interests of serving and former members of the Australian Defence Force, both full time and Reserve members. Full details of the role, purpose and its activities are explained fully in the DFWA website www.dfwa.org. All are encouraged to visit the website as there is a wealth of information, including the details of the following:

- DFWA Constitution;
- DFWA role and responsibilities;
- Support to partners and bereavement advice;
- Discussion on family issues; and
- Currently, detail on the indexation of superannuation campaign.

Indexation of Superannuation. This applies to all forms of Military Superannuation: DFRB; DFRDB; and MSBS. For 20 years now DFWA has been fighting for better indexation of Defence member's superannuation to ensure that payments keep pace with the cost of living. Ever since the Government of the day in 1982 changed the content of the basket of goods, which make up the CPI (which is the measure upon which super payments are indexed), superannuation payments have been eroded and are falling further behind the cost of living.

Successive Governments have commissioned at least seven inquiries into the problem, but to date no improvement has been forthcoming. The latest inquiry, the Matthews' Report, has provided recent advice that little improvement is required and the current CPI methodology is a good method of indexation. DFWA does not agree with these findings, and is actively lobbying for a better system, which will maintain the purchasing power of service pensions, with increases in the cost of living. DFWA prefers pensions to be indexed against the Male Total Average Weekly Earnings (MTAWE) OR the

Pensioner and Beneficiary Living Cost Index (PBLCI) OR the CPI, whichever is the GREATER!

DFWA believes service pensions are falling behind the above pension schemes. Consider this: In the last 20 years, politicians' super has increased by over 140%; aged pensions have increased by 130%; and our super has increased by only a paltry 70%. All DFWA is asking is that defence superannuation is indexed to the same as that used for the Aged Pension.

What has been done about the situation? From the DFWA perspective, quite a lot, but unfortunately the results have been very disappointing. This is mainly because the politicians do not generally reply to emails and letters sent to them or, if they do reply, it is usually couched in terms of government policy in which they attempt to tell us that the CPI is an appropriate form of indexation for our super.

What can you do about it? You can assist by:

- writing letters to your local member of Parliament and or your State Senator;
- writing letters to the editor of your local, State or National newspapers;
- contacting talk-back radio and make your comment when there is a discussion on the plight of pensioners; and
- explaining the situation to your friends and family and encouraging them to do any or all of the above.

Whatever you choose to do, make sure that you are always polite; rudeness will not do our cause any good at all. There will be ongoing updates in each Spanner News, on this and related subjects such as where the DFWA stands with Widows' Pensions, Disability Pensions and Commutation payback.
