OTHER HAPENINGS

106 FIELD WORKSHOP – An Evolutionary Story. In December 2012, 7 Combat Service Support Battalion changed structure from the multiple Combat Service Support Teams of the past into Corps specific sub-units. This was a major organisational change for the Battalion, and it gave rise to the opportunity to re-raise an organisation with a brief but distinguished operational history, with a rich and ongoing legacy – 106 Field Workshop.

The original 106 Field Workshop unit was raised in October 1968 and disbanded in October 1971,

spending practically its entire history deployed to Vietnam. While the spirit of 106 Field Workshop has been kept alive over the last 20 years, in 7 Combat Service Support Battalion through the retention of customs and traditions and the naming of the Battalion recreational facility “the Borlace Club”, the re-raising of 106 Field Workshop has allowed an important element of RAEME history to be brought back to life. This article will go through some history of 106 Field Workshop and touch upon the current activities the revitalised 106 Field Workshop is involved in on behalf of 7 Combat Service Support Battalion in support of 7 Brigade.

106 Field Workshop was deployed to Vietnam on 15 November 1968 as reinforcement for the 1st Australian Task Force (ATF) whose primary Area of Operation was Phuoc Tuy Province. The stated mission of 106 Field Workshop was ‘to provide 2nd line EME services, recovery and repair support at the Task Force Base and throughout the Area of Operations with Forward Repair and Recovery detachments as ordered, and to provide all in-theatre support for Armoured, Cavalry and Artillery equipment.’ In addition, 106 Field Workshop was expected to act as a ‘combat service unit’ and be prepared to fight for its own protection, hold ground, secure its equipment and all equipment undergoing repair, contribute to base security and contribute to active defence from standing patrols to fighting patrols. 106 Field Workshop was held in such high regard by the forces it supported, that the self-appointed motto of ‘The Punch Behind the Task Force Fist’ was universally accepted by all members of the ATF.

106 Field Workshop was raised as a response to a noted major deficiency in the ability of the originally deployed 1st Independent Armoured Squadron Workshop to maintain and improve battle worthiness and equipment recovery for the ATF's equipment, most notably the armoured vehicles. Initially under the command Major W. Hicks-Hall, 106 Field Workshop was based in Nui Dat where it deployed forward repair and recovery teams with, and in close support of, the fighting echelons wherever required. The unit expanded significantly during its time in Vietnam and at its peak was held at a battalion (-) strength, with 535 members serving in total (enlisted, reservists and conscripted).

While undertaking repairs to armoured vehicles, it was quickly identified that rocket propelled grenades and anti-tank mines were causing significant damages and injuries to Australian forces. As early as Mar 1969, 106 Field Workshop began providing technical advice leading to the development and fitment of armour kits. These armour kits proved so effective they were installed as a universal modification to Australian APCs throughout the force, and were credited with saving many lives. On

a lighter note, during the unit's tenure at Nui Dat, 106 Field Workshop adopted a unit mascot, LCPL Charlie Goloski. Charlie was by all accounts a very inquisitive and mischievous monkey. He spent the majority of his days in familiar company at the recovery platoon area, and would often go on recovery missions. Sadly, he passed away and was replaced with another monkey, Suzie, who remained with the unit until its redeployment to Australia in 1971.

106 Field Workshop was withdrawn from Vietnam to Wodonga, Australia in Oct 1971 where it was disbanded. The majority of its documentation and files were destroyed or misplaced, and only limited official evidence of their core functions and operational reporting remain. However, the commander's journals are telling in their pride and attitude towards the work the unit conducted. In the final commander's report for the unit prior to disbanding, the OC Major John Sinclair made the following comments:

"It would have been appropriate to have included in this last report a short history of 106 Fd Wksp...and some comment on what the unit achieved. This has however not been possible. I think it is beyond question that this unit has been very successful throughout the almost three years of its existence. This is the measure of the men who have served with it. It is with some degree of regret that this final report is concluded."

Perhaps the most recognisable piece of 106 Field Workshop history is the Corps painting 'AFV Repair in the Light Green', which is a representation of a 106 Field Workshops Forward Repair Team (FRT) in South Vietnam.

106 Field Workshop was re-formed in the early-1980s at Coopers Plains, and in 1993 moved to Enoggera as part of 6 Brigade Administrative Support Battalion. In Mar 1993, with F88 Austeyr's issued to the unit for the first time, a parade was held to officially disband the unit for the second time. Of note, the current Artificer Sergeant Major of 106 Field Workshop was present at that parade.

Throughout the period 1993 until 2012, the 106 designation has been intermittently maintained throughout the tumultuous times surrounding the disbanding of 6 Brigade and the integration of 6 and 7 Brigade Administrative Support Battalion to generate a legacy for the workshop. During this period, the workshop which formed an integral part of the combat service support battalions, has tried to maintain the links and lineage of the original 106 Field Workshop, using amongst other things, the unit motto, mascot and tactical sign in our correspondence and on sub-unit PT uniforms.

Although as a sub-unit the newly raised 106 Field Workshop is less capable than its battalion sized predecessor, it has demonstrated from the beginning that it can punch well above its weight, in spite of a manning state far below the standard for a Brigade workshop. With 7 Brigade in the RESET Phase of the Force generation cycle (FGC), 106 Field Workshop provided the main effort tasked with remediating all Brigade equipment to fully functional in preparation for transition to the READYING Phase. 106 Field Workshop is continuing to complete this task while concurrently raising a Forward Repair Group and Combat Service Support Team Headquarters to support the opposing force on Exercise Talisman Sabre 2013. The recovery element has been heavily tasked, but is performing admirably, providing a full section to the Forward Repair Group while maintaining responsibility for the national recovery plan for South East Queensland and support to the rest of the Brigade. Despite the heavy workload, both retention and recruitment are excellent, with members withdrawing discharge and the workshop expanding as a disproportionate number of new craftsmen request their first posting be with 106 Field Workshop.

As with our legacy unit, success in these undertakings is not a result of the equipment or organisation, but instead is a measure of the men currently serving in the unit. Their drive and professionalism lives up to the legacy which they are now part of, and allows them to perform above and beyond the expectations placed on them. 106 Field Workshop is an exciting organisation to be part of and as it grows in the future can only become an even more desired place to be.

Corps History Project (CHP). This article provides a summary of the outcomes from a recent CHP Planning Workshop held on 7 Sep 13, at 20 STA Regt Conference Room, Brisbane. It is provided for the information of all RNA members.

As the Chair of the meeting, I want to thank the CHP Team members for giving up their valuable weekend time, contributing fully to the discussion and accepting a range of new tasks. I very much appreciate the spirit of 'voluntarism' that was abroad in the conference room and the commitment of all attendees, as well as the messages of encouragement and support, from those who were not able to attend, namely the Deputy PD, Mr Chris Mead; and one of the editors, Mr Frank Benfield.

The aim of the planning day was twofold:

- take stock of CHP progress to date, and
- plan the next series of tasks leading to publication.

Taking Stock. The three authors/editors (Mr Max Carmichael, Mr Frank Benfield and MAJ Keirin Joyce) have made substantial progress and the Lead Author, Mr Max Carmichael, provided a progress report of the 19 chapters current underway. In summary:

- Chapters at “review completed” stage – 9;
- Chapters at first draft stage – 6;
- Chapters yet to be addressed – 4;
- Review/Editing – Mr Frank Benfield has joined the team recently and is providing an excellent review and editing service in support of the other two authors/editors. This has enabled the writing and review process to speed up and proceed more effectively although the project remains slightly behind schedule;
- Bibliography – being addressed progressively as the chapters are drafted – all contributors are being acknowledged; and
- Finally, Mr Carmichael is pleased with the quantity and quality of contributions now available to him and with some further research of the Corps archives at the Army Logistic Museum, will be “fleshing out” those chapters where there is a paucity of detail. He has also been provided with access to all back issues of the “Craftsman” magazine from which other stories may be drawn.

In team discussion, it was agreed that the size of the book may be growing too large, and that the book’s size should stay roughly within the parameters of the project brief, around 300 pages. The author was directed to undertake some “heavy editing” of the early chapters, a reduction in the Defence Cooperation Project (DCP) chapter, look carefully the size of each chapter to obtain a better balance of stories and discuss with the PD the desire to have an recently retired RAEME officer, draft the ‘Forward’ and a ‘Lead in Passage’ for the last Chapter ‘The Spirit of RAEME’.

Issues raised by the Lead Author. Mr Carmichael raised several issues that were resolved as follows:

- **Photographs.** To date the team has not received enough specific photographs, which support the stories provided. The Team decided to cast a wider net for suitable

photographs, consider the balance between narrative and available photographs and obtain better quality photographs, where possible, which can be used creatively in the book.

- **Schedule.** The original production schedule has slipped due to the initially slow response from contributors to the book, and the desire to include a few more stories, which have been promised. It was agreed that a ‘final’ cut-off date would be 1 Dec 13. Contributions received after that date would be kept in the CHP Repository in perpetuity.
- **Publishing.** There is a pressing need to approach a publisher and establish criteria for the book’s layout, format, publishing methodology and costs. The team agreed to commence this work in the next few months.

Discussion Points. A number of important topics were considered by the CHP Team.

- **CHP Repository.** WO1 Paul Gibbs. Paul, the manager of the CHP repository, provided the team with an update on the progress of the development and management of the CHP Repository. It now contains a comprehensive archive of all the stories provided to date, including those being placed in the book and those that have not been used. His aim has been to preserve the material in a secure electronic format; ensure it properly catalogued and can be easily accessed by the authors; and that in time it could be used in other ways by members of the Corps in perpetuity.
- Paul also tabled a proposal to the RAEME National Association, from the Victoria Barracks Chapter, of the RAEME Association–Victoria, to develop a facility that ‘coordinates and collates the presentation of the online electronic Corps History Repository’, which can be accessed by all members of the Corps – past and present – allows the RAEME National Association to ‘gather, edit and present stories and information’ and ‘incorporate (all material) into a nationally managed and supported website’. This facility will also promote the ‘ethos and values of the Corps as required by the RAEME National Association Charter’. In addition the proposal also amalgamates www.raeme.info site, a privately owned website, which retired WO1 Bob Thompson, has sponsored, developed and maintained over many years.
- **Sponsorship and Fundraising.** COL COMDT-QLD, COL Richard Kluckhohn,

reported that fundraising was going well and he was pleased with fundraising results to date and that he and LTCOL Chris Mead would continue to pursue opportunities. In summary, the financial support has allowed the project team to move the author to various sites to obtain stories, photographs and conduct interviews with key contributors. This support will become increasingly important when the book commences its detailed editing process and the team explores the options for publication in detail.

- **RAEME National Association.** The Chair, Mr Ray Norman, confirmed the commitment of the RAEME National Association to the project, its enthusiasm to assist where possible in publicizing the project, the RNA's longer term plans to use the developing RAEME National website as a vehicles for publicizing and marketing the book, and their desire to assist in distribution if necessary. He also emphasised the RAEME National Association's desire to facilitate the Victoria Barracks Chapter's plans for the repository development mentioned above. To this end he outlined the crucial work being undertaken nationally by a very loyal band of technically oriented band of volunteers in all states to keep that work going.
- **HOC Representative.** MAJ Graham Anderson, representing the SO2 Corps Heritage, MAJ John Halstead, and HOC Cell, re-iterated the HOC's commitment to the goals of the CHP plan and acknowledged the good work being done by the volunteer team and the authors. In his own right Graham has volunteered to conduct a raffle to raise further funds for the project and advised that the prizes were now shaping up as: An original version of the previous Corps history 'Craftsmen of the Australian Army' (currently worth about \$400 on eBay); Corps miniatures and a some donated prints of the Corps Banner Presentation ceremony parade, kindly donated by Mr Frank Benfield. Graham will advise further detail on the method of conducting the raffle shortly.

Moving Forward. Outcomes from the meeting to assist the team move to the next stage include the following:

- **Style, Format and Tone of the Book.** As mentioned the team, agreed that the pictorial style of the book should be modified a little to accommodate the lack of specific photographs supporting contributors' stories

and the final product will be more of a "history book with pictures" obtained from a variety of sources than a pictorial history.

- **Publication and Distribution of the Book.** Further research and work needs to commence immediately to identify the best course of action for printing, publishing, ordering and distributing the finished book.
- **Book Launch Planning.** The consensus of the team was for a launch in 2014 on the RAEME Corps Birthday (around 1 Dec 14), subject to the planning to be undertaken for publishing, and the editing process being completed satisfactorily.
- **Raffle.** HOC Cell take will responsibility for the conduct of the above mentioned raffle on a date to be advised.
- **Photograph and Story Competition.** Nick Rees will take the lead in formalising and finalising the conduct of the photograph and story competition with Paul Gibbs' assistance and using the CHP repository.
- **Pre-ordering and ongoing ordering Process.** Paul Gibbs undertook to consider ways of establishing and implementing an ordering process to gauge initially the level of interest and then put in place an enduring ordering process for the long term.

Conclusion. There is much to be proud of with the work being done by the CHP Team. I am grateful for their support and commitment, but also the support from current and former HOC, the HOC Cell, Commanders and Commanding officers, Officers Commanding RAEME Regional representatives, the RAEME National Association and state and unit based associations and chapters; but most of all I am delighted with the work of the many contributors – we have a book and it is coming together well. Well done to all involved – it is a big team effort!

DFWA COMMUNICATIONS

DFWA activities have increased in our fight for better indexation. Rallies and seminars were held in various suburbs of Brisbane and Ipswich over the last couple of weeks of the election campaign. However it is clear that there won't be any change to the recently announced Labor and Coalition DFRDB, MSBS and disability pension policies before the election. Frustrating though it may be, we must continue to put our case forward although it is difficult when the media are fixated on many other things at this time. At least, for the first time, both major parties have recognised the need for a wage based indexation which is a start, but there is a long way to go.

In summary the situation prior to the election is as follows:

- **Labor's policy** is aimed at the over 65 age group, and based on the PBLCI and/or the CPI but not the MTAWA so there will be very little benefit for the 40% of veterans who will be affected. There is no change for either MSBS or the disability pension.
- **The Coalition's policy** will restore full indexation using the same indexation as the age pension. The MTAWA, the PBLCI and/or the CPI whichever is the higher. Unfortunately it is only for the over 55s. This will stop the erosion for 90% of DFRDB and DFRB, so a start has been

made. There is no change for either MSBS or the disability pension.

A rally was held outside Kevin Rudd's office on Friday 30 Aug 13. Only 6-8 people attended but we waved placards at passing motorists and spoke to locals, so perhaps we had some effect. During this rally, Mr Bill Glasson, who stood against Kevin Rudd, turned up for a while. We had fruitful discussions so he at least is now in the picture as to what we ultimately require.

The result, as they say, is now history.

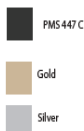

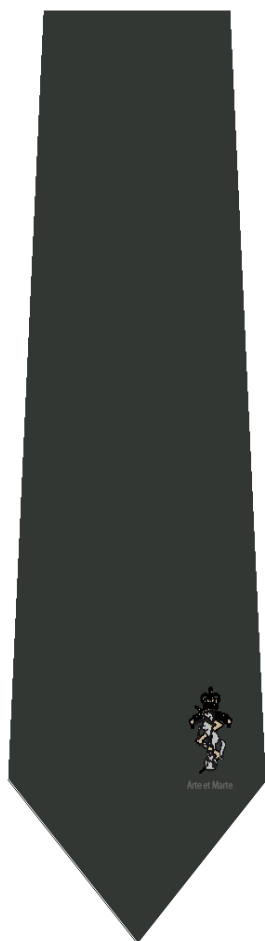
