KNOW YOUR REP COL COMD BRIG DAVID MCGAHEY CSC (RTD)

Dave McGahey was raised in SE Queensland and enlisted in the ARA as an Army Apprentice (27th Intake) in 1972. In 1978, he graduated from the Officer Cadet School Portsea, into the Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.



Following a series of command and staff appointments, he was selected in 1987 to serve as an UN Military Observer with the United Nations Truce Supervision Organisation in Palestine (UNTSO). On return to Australia he served in staff appointments in HQ 1 Div and then assumed command of 102 Fd Wksp (ODF) in 1991.

After attending Command and Staff College, Queenscliff, in 1993, he managed a number of projects including the Army Presence in the North (APIN) and Army Ready Reserve Project. In 1996 he assumed command of 1 BASB and then raised the 1st Combat Services Support Battalion, (1CSSB) 1st Bde, in Darwin. Dave was awarded the Conspicuous Service Cross in the 1998 Queen's Birthday Honours List for his contribution to the Army.

This was followed by tours of duty in the US Army Materiel Command; Simulation Target Acquisition and Guided Weapons (DSTAGW SPO) in Land Systems Division, Defence Materiel Organisation, Melbourne; and operational service as the Deputy Chief of Staff-Support, HQ Peacekeeping Force, United Nations Transitional Authority in East Timor (UNTAET).

In 2002 he attended the Australian Defence College, and on graduation, he was promoted to Brigadier and assumed the appointment of Director General Materiel Systems (DGMATIS) in MISD, DMO. Most importantly, from 2003 to 2007, he performed the duties of Head of Corps RAEME (an honorary appointment). His final posting in uniform was in Iraq as the Commanding General of Task Force Iraqi Security Forces Logistics. He returned to Australia in May 2009 and retired from the Australian Army in December 2009. At that time he assumed his current appointment as the Program Director of the Defence Logistics Transformation Project. Dave's interests include keeping fit, reading and fishing. He and his wife Susan, have two adult children Raasha and Robbie.

The RAMS hangar was converted into a spacious dining room and anteroom for the evening, including a bar and plenty of cam netting. The night started with drinks in the anteroom as old colleagues reacquainted while the official guests were introduced. Promotions were then handed out by BRIG Mathewson to MAJ Tarleton and WO2 McCulloch before the guests assembled at the dining tables.

Earlier that day, RAMS celebrated the RAEME Birthday with their traditional activities promoting esprit de corps. These activities included the Spanner Throw competition, an all-in knockout volleyball game, and the Eggheads Catapult Challenge. The catapult challenge involved teams of two building catapult-like devices to shoot eggs at a target some distance awav. The outgoing Commanding Officer, LTCOL Michael Millar made a guest appearance as the final target, complete with makeshift armour. Raymond Norman OAM President RAEME National Association **2012 RAEME Birthday Celebrations – Gallipoli Barracks.** In late November 2012 Gallipoli Barracks erupted with activity as the RAEME birthday was celebrated using an Aviation Maintenance theme with much fanfare and solid esprit de corps. Whilst organised by our Aviation Maintainer brethren, the day was punctuated with cake and celebrations hosted by 7 CSSB, but not before some traditional and not-so traditional competitions were held.

Of course the RAEME Billy Cart Race, a two kilometre extravaganza that makes the Clipsal 500 look like a Sunday drive, was the show piece. But prior to that historic classic, teams competed in the Egg Catapult Challenge, the Tug-O-War, and the Aviation Maintenance Relay.

The egg catapult challenge naturally involved eggs and a catapult. The catapult, or large slingshot, was owned by one member of the organising team - it apparently had something to do with his time with the Navy and resupply at sea... The catapult was set-up in the cricket nets providing good control of arcs of fire. Each team had a sighting shot and then two scored egg shots. Teams brought along their own padding material to protect the eggs. Points were awarded for distance travelled, while bonus points were awarded for successful catches and unbroken eggs. The intent of the scoring system was to encourage well controlled mid distance shots - in true RAEME style all teams went for maximum distance. Most teams landed their projectile at 50-80 meter distance; some caught the egg, while most broke. 7 CSSB workshops won with the egg catapult with two 70 metre shots, and also took out the inaugural SRP encouragement award for reusing their egg which remained unbroken.

The annual Tug-O-War competition was hotly contested between the SE QLD based workshops. Eight teams competed in a knock-out style competition format that saw the SE QLD based RAEME trainees, under the ALTC banner, comfortably brush aside all before them. Due to the ease of the victory the chief referee had cause to question the diet, physical training and sport science regime in place at Bandiana leading up to the competition. Following much deliberation by the referee's panel the allegations were dismissed: tactics, teamwork and especially youth found to be behind the ALTC victory and the perpetual trophy found a new home.

The Aviation Maintenance Relay was quite a challenge to the teams, however much can be said about the flare, coordination and fitness of the RAEME Crafty. Essentially a 1.2km track with 400m sprint legs, a 100m wheel barrow section, and a cunningly design four-legged race section with three people tied together by the ankles simulating the difficulty of the 'three signature requirement' of aviation maintenance operations. Another ALTC win, however the show point was the ease and speed with which our soldiers coordinated for the final section of the race. Anticipating a calamity of discombobulating bodies, organisers were stunned to witness racing with the speed and grace only afforded the likes of Usain Bolt. So impressive was the speed and coordination of our "Crafties" that either extensive MREs were conducted prior to the day, or another visit to the DFRT is in order for a further pay increment.

RAEME CORPS HISTORY PROJECT – DETAILED GUIDELINES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

This project provides a wonderful opportunity to record individuals' experiences, or those of their mates and colleagues. Therefore you should not be constrained from presenting your stories in your own style, but be aware that the editorial board reserves the right to "standardise" the style of storytelling throughout the publication. Writers may chose to draft a complete story, or provide dot points outline, from which a story may be created. Collaborations are welcomed. In either event, you will be asked to observe the following broad guidelines:

- **Outline** the broad context of the story:
 - **What** was the operation in which the formation, unit, sub-unit, team, individual(s) or equipment was engaged?
 - What were the circumstances leading to the event depicted?
 - Where was the broader activity being undertaken?
- **Identify**, describe and explain the situation, action, event or activity depicted in the photograph:
 - Where did the activity occur?
 - In what operation, exercise or setting did the activity depicted occur?
 - **Provide** the identity of any equipment, (aircraft, vehicle, plant or watercraft) or weapon(s) depicted in the photographs.
 - **Describe** the degree of danger and/or technical and practical difficulty involved in the situation.
 - **Explain** the outcome of the situation and what happened immediately after the situation depicted in the photograph.
- **Conclude** the description of the event and story and relate it to the photograph:
 - **Outline** the conclusion of the event and the consequences.
 - **Sum-up** highlights of the event/experience.
- **Identify** (name and rank) the soldier(s) depicted in the photograph. Also include as much background information on each soldier as possible. For example:
 - **His** or **her** specific role in the activity shown.
 - **How** long each soldier had been in the Army at the time of the activity depicted.
 - The soldier's origins –did he or she start with RAEME as an apprentice, or was he or she an adult trainee, or entered the Corps by another means.
 - What happened to them after the depicted situation ended?
 - Are the individual(s) still serving, what rank did he or she attain during their service, or what civilian occupation did they go to after discharge/retirement?
 - **Describe** any amusing anecdotes, regarding any of the soldiers depicted, during their time with the unit.
 - Were any of the soldiers renown for any particular skill/activity/behaviour (e.g. Service representative in sport, a particular character)? This information should be provided as an addition to the information provided to support the photograph.
